## SOMMERS ROAD BREAST CANCER TRIBUTE

For Sue Stevens and Peggy O'Donnell, the idea of a 'bra bar' in the front yard of their Sommers Road home in Brunswick Junction is to raise awareness about the importance of routine screening and early detection of breast cancer.

The display of over 200 pairs of bras in October each year began about six years ago after both ladies were diagnosed with breast cancer within months of each other. Both Sue and Peggy underwent countless surgeries, chemotherapy and radiation treatments to overcome the disease.

"A lot of people stop to have a look and talk to us," said Sue. "They've heard about us and come for a drive to Brunswick to have a look. Only recently a lady was walking past and stopped to ask what it was all about. She then removed the bright pink bra she was wearing and donated it for our display." "Some people have even asked if they could have a pair," said Peggy. When speaking to Sue and Peggy it is clear they are determined to make a difference. Both of these beautiful ladies have faced their fair share of challenges, but through it all have emerged stronger and more resilient. As a community we are very lucky to have these wonderful people dedicated to raising awareness on such important issues.

#### MINECRAFT TREASURE TRAIL


